

MU football legend plays with disadvantaged kids in Joburg

Manchester United's Ryan Giggs has been named the newest Laureus Ambassador, which he kicked off by playing with some youngsters at the Sport for All project in Katlehong, near Johannesburg earlier this month.

Giggs played a record 963 times for Manchester United, 64 times for Wales and four times for Team GB during the London Olympics in 2012. During his 23 years at Old Trafford, he won 13 Premier League winner's medals and was in teams which won the FA Cup four times, the League Cup three times and the Champions League twice.

Giggs, who starts a new career later this year as Assistant Manager of Manchester United under Louis Van Gaal, said: "I am delighted to be named a Laureus Ambassador and would like to thank the members of the Laureus World Sports

Academy for inviting me. I have always believed, like Laureus, that sport can change people's lives, so I am looking forward to doing what I can to help.

"My dream as a youngster was always to play for Manchester United and I was lucky enough to be able to do that. It was great to meet the boys and girls at the Sport for All project and I was able to tell them how important it is for them to have their own dreams and hopes and how they must work hard to achieve them."

Funding for more than 500 orphans and vulnerable children

The Laureus Sport for Good Foundation has contributed funding for more than 500 orphans and vulnerable children to attend sports coaching with Sport for All, in poor and underdeveloped township areas in South Africa. Sport for All is currently based in 16 locations around the country. The children can play any sport they want to, including cricket, football, hockey, netball, rugby, volleyball, tennis or even various traditional games. Attending Sport for All coaching gives these children an outlet for their stress and escape from their daily troubles. It allows them to be just a 'normal child' for a few hours every day.

Laureus Ambassador Lucas Radebe, the iconic Leeds United and Bafana Bafana captain said: "I had the privilege of playing against Giggs during my time in England. We had some memorable games. He is one of the true all-time greats in the game. The term legend is often used for players - in his case it is absolutely appropriate. I also know as a person, he has a big heart. As a fellow Laureus Ambassador, I welcome him to South Africa on behalf of the organisation."

Laureus World Sports Academy member Bobby Charlton, and a Director of MU who has known Giggs throughout his career at Old Trafford, said: "I first saw Ryan at our Salford training ground. I saw a young boy pick the ball up, dribble past four or five players and then hit a left foot shot towards the goal. I said to Alex [Ferguson], 'Who the hell was that?' He said, 'It's a young lad called Ryan and we think he's going to be play for us next year'. That was about 25 years ago and I am so proud of what he's done for Manchester United and for football in general. On behalf of the Laureus Academy I am thrilled that Ryan has agreed to help us with our charity work and I am personally delighted that he is joining us at Laureus."
