Having a reliable encrypted service for messaging within the business

Whether you're sending emails or instant messages back and forth, you're going to need a service that will enable you to do so reliably. A lot of the free email and IM services out there are unsecure and sometimes have lags and downtimes. To help ensure that emails reach inboxes on time and that communication can happen in real time as needed, you will want to use a paid service.
